


UPPER-LEVEL STUDENTS





FINANCIAL AID & AFFORDABILITY

- Harvard financial aid is need-based and admissions is need-blind.
- 100% of demonstrated need is met.
- 25% of Harvard college families pay nothing to attend.
- 86% of U.S. families would qualify for financial aid.
- 55% of students receive financial aid.
- There are **no student loans** required. **100**% of students can graduate debt free.

\$100K* and under

Families with total incomes \$100k* and under will pay nothing to attend Harvard



Families with total incomes between \$100k-\$200k* receive free tuition, with additional aid likely

\$200k* and over

Families with incomes above \$200k* may still qualify for financial aid, depending on individual circumstances
